All of the tangible ways that we are the body of Christ can be felt once again.

To hear all the ways that God has been working in you, the elders and deacons have been participating in a listening campaign. If you haven’t seen the publicity for this yet, you should’ve received a phone call from an elder or deacon who has a number of questions. We want to hear how God has been present to you and your thoughts on how our congregation can move forward in our new reality together. I encourage you to take the time to connect with the leaders and share your experiences.

I also encourage you to prayerfully read through this edition of the Bagpipe and consider the ways that you can be involved with the amazing work that God is doing among us. If you feel comfortable, consider coming to Sunday worship in-person. If you’re not ready for indoor gatherings, consider coming to the outdoor Spring Smoke-off and Congregational Campout taking place on May 14th. I’m excited to hear the ways that God is working in you and I’m excited to listen, together, to God’s word for us.

Holy Week April 10-17

Procession of the Palms/Passion Sunday



Our worship marks the day Jesus rode into Jerusalem as King while the crowds shouted ‘Hosanna’ and welcomed his victory over the dark powers of this world— only days later to join voices with those powers, shouting: ‘Crucify him!’

Maundy Thursday

This service reminds us of many truths our Savior spoke in his last evening as God in Flesh.

The word “Maundy,” comes from the Latin *mandatum*, meaning *mandate* or *commandment*. On Maundy Thursday, Jesus washed the disciples’ feet and gave us a new commandment: “Love one another as I have loved you.”



The Tenebrae is an ancient order for worship on the last three days of Holy Week and had its origins in the 4th century. The Latin word “tenebrae” means darkness or shadows and may be named because Jesus and the disciples went from the Last Supper into the darkness of their night in Gethsemane. It may also come from the account of the crucifixion, where “there was darkness over all the land until the ninth hour.” It may come from John 1:5, “The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it.”

Regardless, the distinctive feature of Tenebrae is the gradual extinction of all light except one candle. Join us on Thursday, April 14 at 6:30pm to celebrate the Last Supper and to affirm our belief that the apparent powers of darkness cannot overwhelm the Light of the world.




Good Friday

Support our Ukrainian siblings

Europe is facing its largest humanitarian crisis since World War II. The United Nations estimates up to 18 million people, both internally displaced and refugees, will eventually be impacted.

According to reports from Action by Churches Together (ACT) Alliance, Ukrainians are facing reduced or disrupted services in water, heating, electricity, transportation and telecommunications. Health services have deteriorated rapidly due to shortages of medical supplies and personnel.

Refugees, mostly women, children, people with disabilities and the elderly, had to leave their homes and spend days traveling to neighboring countries for safety, with almost nothing with them.

Your gifts to One Great Hour of Sharing allow for an immediate response from Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) when emergencies first occur, often responding to crises that never make it into the news.

In this volatile situation, PDA was able to provide urgent funding to trusted, established partners with the expertise to carry out humanitarian aid. Reformed and Orthodox church partners, like the Community of St. Egidio and Hungarian Reformed Church Aid, are working closely with local churches and organizations to provide food, water, clothing, shelter, psychosocial support and other basic items for survival. They are the “boots on the ground,” listening and responding to the needs of those impacted.


In this season of Lent, pray for our siblings in Ukraine. Pray for peace. And pray that all of us will remember that we are the Church, **together**.






Legacy Ministry: Frequently Asked Questions

What is the Legacy Ministry?

Under the direction of the Witness Committee of the Session, The Legacy Ministry is charged with raising awareness of the opportunity afforded us to leave a legacy of Christian witness for generations to follow through the use of a will and/or our church endowment funds.

What is an Endowment Fund?

An endowment fund is an income-generating fund in which all contributions, once made, are restricted from being distributed. Instead, these contributions are invested and any

What are our guidelines for endowment interest distribution?

If a donor's gift is unrestricted, the interest is:

- 1. used to make inflationary adjustments to the principal so it maintains its earning power in perpetuity*
- 2. utilized to cover any budgetary shortfall that may have occurred that year*
- 3. contributed to a nominal distribution for the ongoing work of the Legacy Ministry*
- 4. divided equally between the church's capital and mission funds*

Is there a minimum amount required in order for my gift to be included in the endowment fund?

No. Like all ministries of our church, this is a community effort in which we pool our resources to the glory of God, whether "great" or "small, but still great."

What is the Legacy Society?

Made up of individuals who have elected to include FPC-Holt in their estate planning, the purpose of the Legacy Society is to provide a forum in which our congregation can express appreciation to these donors during their lifetime.

Why should I include the endowment fund in my will?

To contribute to the ongoing ministry of Jesus Christ. An endowed gift can be a living monument that continually pours new life into Christ's church, even after one's death.

If you have already included the church in your will/estate planning, please notify Kirk Miller so we might be able to offer a word of thanks to you on behalf of generations to come.

- Dismantling structural racism by fearlessly applying our faith to advocate and break down the systems, practices and thinking that underlie discrimination, bias, prejudice and oppression of people of color
- Eradicating systemic poverty by acting on our beliefs and working to change laws, policies, plans and structures in our society that perpetuate economic exploitation of people who are poor

ABOUT THE MATTHEW 25 MARK

The circular shape represents unity and equality. Like God, a circle has no beginning and no end, and it symbolizes our continuing effort to help one another. The shape also suggests a globe that points to our engagement with the world.

The three interlocking figures represent the equality of all people without gender or race bias. They have their arms around each other, symbolizing friendship, protection and service. The number three suggests the three focus areas of congregational vitality, structural racism and systematic poverty, as well as the Trinity.

The color palette is bright, lively, friendly and energetic — suggestive of our active commitment.

Finally, **the legend** "Matthew 25" below the symbol is the literal identification of the mark. We use a handwritten font to make the point that active engagement in the world requires human effort.
